



Common Security and Defence Policy Common Module The experiences of two cadets

Introduction

From the 23rd until the 27th of April 2018, the Common Security and Defence Policy (CSDP) 'Common Module' took place at the Hellenic Air Force (HAFA) Academy in Athens, Greece. These so-called common modules are part of a bigger European initiative to promote the exchange of young military officers, cadets and security studies students, which is called 'EMILYO' (Exchange of Military Young Officers), inspired by Erasmus. The goal of these exchanges within the framework of EMILYO is to promote and improve interoperability of various European militaries and the security and defence sectors. Moreover, the concerning participants are the future military and security sector elites whom should understand, at least at a basic level, what their future role in international defence and security cooperation might be. Therefore, the goal of this Common Module was to give a broad overview of the European Security and Defence Policy. On the other hand, another reasonably important aspect of this week was to enjoy our time in Greece with participants from all over Europe and, in that way, expand our network. People from seven different countries participated: Belgium, Bulgaria, France, Greece, Italy, Poland and last but not least the Netherlands. Greek cadets from the army, air force, navy and police academy and also students from multiple Greek universities took part. The international students were mainly cadets from several military academies, both army and air force.

Lectures and working groups

The week consisted of multiple interesting lectures, varying from the subject of lessons learned from EU space missions and operations to the European Union External Action Service (EEAS) and Crisis Management Structures. Most lectures were delivered by Greek professors, but some international lecturers gave presentations as well. Among others, the Belgian dr. Joris van Bladel from the Austrian Institute for European and Security policy and advisor to the Austrian Ministry of Defence gave two brilliant lectures on the EEAS. Also dr. Daniel Fiott, security and defence editor at the European Union Institute for Security Studies, gave some great insight in the EU Global Strategy. Besides the lectures, Thursday consisted of a working group case study, conducted by the Institute of Research and Training on European Affairs. In short, cadets and students were divided into mixed syndicates, forming several EU institutes such as the Crisis Management and Planning Directorate (CMPD), the Civilian Planning and Conduct Capability (CPCC) and the European Commission. Then we were handed a case of an artificial scenario in North Africa (called 'Sodor' in this case) and a simulated total budget of €15 million. During the day, the goal was to come up with a solution to the fictional Sodor crisis by devising an external European military and/or civilian mission and/or operation. The process to come to this solution was a combination of giving presentations, debating and cooperation between the several EUinstitutes. The final result was a combination of a military and civilian mission/operation which was, fortunately, even approved by the 'European Commission'!
