





STUDENTS	Military and Civilian Students
TEACHING CONTENTS	 Presentation of factors determining the tasks and nature of the armed forces and the defense potential of selected countries in the World; Influence on shaping and development of defense policy; Characterizing the regional and global dimensions of changes taking place in military sphere.
