Observations

- The threat of war in Europe is real
- The Ukraine War has highlighted the importance of multilateralism
- Collective security alliances can limit the spread of war



What lessons learned can we identify today?

The war in Ukraine is complex and ongoing

- The war has taken different forms (Conventional, insurgency, Hybrid warfare)
- It is too early to draw lessons
- Lack of adaptability by Russian officers



Preamble

- We need to avoid drawing conclusions rapidly or chase the topic of the day
- In general, basic officer development of leadership skills and basic military competencies remain valid
- It is difficult to change basic officer curriculum
 - -Army or service regulations and policies
 - -University or Academy regulations and policies
- A single solution is difficult to apply to all military academy models
- We should not focus on what <u>can be</u> incorporated into the curriculum, but rather what <u>should be</u> incorporated on the basis of the lessons learned



Recommendations

- Because of the limited time we have to prioritize wisely
- Reinforce intellectual adaptability
- Reinforce development of officer intellectual curiosity and flexibility
- Reinforce intercultural awareness and understanding
- Reinforce current emphasis on English language training as the current <u>operational</u> language of NATO and the emerging <u>tactical</u> language of NATO
- Enhance EMILYO programs (
