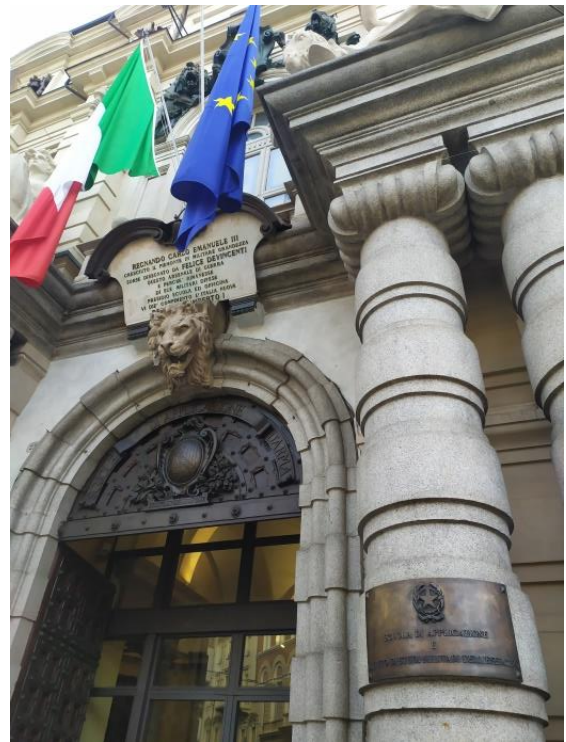

The common module “*Biosafety and Bioterrorism*” was organised by the School of Applied Military Studies (SAMS) in Italy, under the auspices of the European Security and Defence College, in the framework of the **European initiative for the exchange of young officers inspired by Erasmus**. 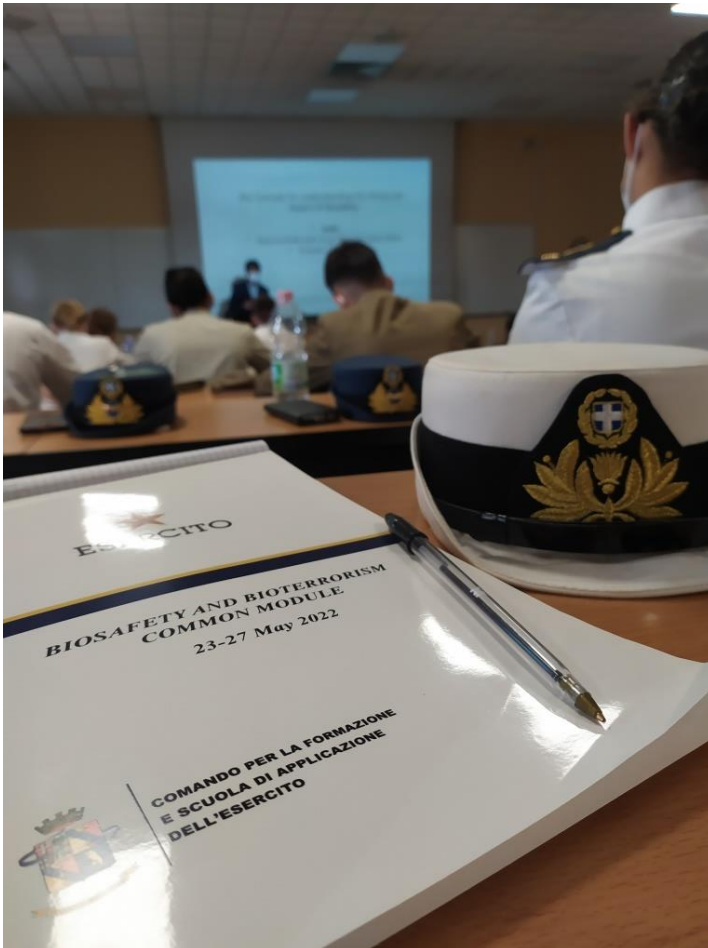


On the first day, an ice-breaking event was organised inside the academy.
