Group assignment: The group assignment will centre on the presentation and discussion of a significant European battle of the 20th century. This battle should be linked to the key concepts explored throughout the course. Project evaluation will be based on criteria that assess each cadet's ability to identify, analyse, compare, and explain core concepts in Military History, Additionally, the evaluation will consider individual contributions, responsibility, and autonomy, particularly during the C&A session.
